LEGISLATIVE ACTION NEEDED NOW

In addition to HJRCA0005 (Amendment #5 – see page 3 of the WEB VERSION of the February RTAC *News Bulletin*) which is a Constitutional amendment that will require that the Chicago City Council approve ANY Chicago Teacher's Pension Fund (CTPF) 'pension beneft increase' by a threeffths vote (30 of the 50 aldermen), there are several other legislative initiatives that you need to be aware of.

The Chicago Teacher's Pension Fund has f ve legislative initiatives of utmost importance to all of us. They are described in detail in Mary Sharon Reilly's Pension report later in this news bulletin (See pages 8-10).

They are 1) Eliminate the of fset of State of Illinois revenue; 2) Increase the State of Illinois contributions to CTPF; 3) Increase FY 2013 CPS contributions to CTPF; 4) Increase the cap on retiree healthcare spending; 5) Rede f ne re-employment provision for retirees. PLEASE READ HER FULL REPORT and then contact your legislators and express your opinions about these provisions.

In addition to the five CTPF initiatives, R TAC has several other legislative issues you should be aware of:

HB3827 sponsored by Representative Cross proposes to replace the current CTPF pension board with a seven member board, four of which will be appointed by the mayor, in effect giving the mayor full control of all of our pension moneyWe are AGAINST this proposal.

HB5172 sponsored by Representative Colvin would add one more annuitant to the CTPF Board

of Directors. Since the number of annuitants is approaching the number of active teachers, an additional annuitant would provide equal representation. We are FOR this proposal.

HB3398 sponsored by Representative Rita amends the CTPF Article of the Illinois Pension Code to provide that the Board of Education shall demand and direct the City Council to levy a tax of 0.1% annually and that those revenues be paid to the City Treasurer and held for the benef t of CTPF. We are FOR this proposal.

Some issues that have not been introduced as formally proposed bills are listed on the RTAC.ORG website in the 'Pending Bills' section. These include the elimination of the 3% cost of living increase and/ or applying the 5% Illinois income tax to our pensions and/or eliminating our health insurance subsidy.

Be aware that, even though the deadline for submitting proposed legislation for this session has passed, anything may be added to an existing bill as an amendment Many things can happen during the last several days of a legislative session. So please remain alert.

Probably the most dangerous time for our pension will be after the November electionAlso, please be sure to read our Executive director's comments on the 'lame duck' legislature.

CONTACT YOUR STATE SENATOR TO STOP AMENDMENT #5

HJRCA0005 (Amendment #5) is a Constitutional amendment that will require that the Chicago City Council approve ANY CTPF 'pension beneft increase' by a three-f fths vote (30 of the 50 aldermen). Wording seems to be very ambiguous and open to interpretation, which will probably lead to considerable litigation.

This amendment may require the Chicago City Council to vote to allow our 3% automatic annual increase (since the Constitution trumps the provision in the pension law). This may also affect future retirees as it is unclear whether a salary increase provided through CTU and CPS contract negotiations (thus raising our potential pension bene fts) falls

into the category of a 'pension beneft increase'.

This amendment will be a way for the Chicago City Council to control, i.e. reduce, pension costs for ALL public employees, including police and f refighters. It is expected to pass the House, so attention is being focused on the Senate. Visit, call, fax, email, snailmail your state senator. This amendment will change the Illinois Constitution FOREV - ER. Remember, it is only the 1970 Constitution that protects our pension; this amendment opens the door to revising our benefts. For example, the City Council would be able to cap our COLA (Cost of Living Adjustment) if this amendment is ratified.

Legislation which may affect your pension, along with the current status of that legislation, is posted on the 'Pending Bills' page. Detrimental legislation is highlighted in orange while favorable legislation is highlighted in green. Please visit, call or mail your legislators with your opinions

about this legislation. Last year it was YOUR voice through visits, letters and calls that helped to table HB3827, a bill that would have given the Mayor of Chicago complete control of ALL of Chicago's pension funds, including CTPF. However, HB3827 has been introduced AGAIN this session!

Contact information for all of the legislators is posted, both alphabetically and by district. If you do

not know your district(s), there is a link to Project Vote Smart where you can enter your nine digit zip code and get that information.

In addition to the 'Pending Bills' page, events of interest to retired teachers are posted on the 'Events and Activities' page. There is also an extensive list of organizations that are looking for volunteer help on the 'V olunteer' page - a partial list is included elsewhere in this bulletin. There is also a limited number

of employment opportunities posted on the 'Jobs' page.

OUR OVERALL ECONOMY

In looking at our overall economic conditions we are still in fuenced to some degree by economic threats in Europe. A good deal of posturing has been and is still being performed. In addition to events and rather poor economic conditions in Greece and Italy, other problems are noted in Ireland, Portugal and Spain. According to Callan Associates, our overall pension fund managers, the solution comes down to Germany, a rather rich country that may or may not partially support the debts of the other countries mentioned.

Despite these problems overseas, there are several signs of good progress on our road to recovery here in the United States. Stock evaluations are favorable and dividend yields are strong. As to United States equities, they f nished this last quarter with double digit returns. Foreign equity markets did not do as well and emerging markets out paced developed markets. A shining star is the S&P 500 which was up 11.8% for the quarter---the highest gain since the middle of 2009. In short, there are signs of good progress.

OUR PENSION FUND

The latest total value of our fund is \$9.2 billion, which represents an increase of \$511 million in market appreciation. At the same time we withdrew \$243 million for beneft payments. This is due to the lack of adequate support by both the Board of Education and the State of Illinois. The amounts they forward to our fund are not adequate to provide the fund overall

growth as needed. We did not meet our policy target and ranked at the 42nd percentile level of our peers in public pension funds. Our international equity managers, Earnest Partners, Lazard, Morgan Stanley and William Blair, all performed favorably as to their targets and they continue to do well.

Looking back over 2011, we were above our benchmark but below the median of our public pension peers. As to our fund segments, international equity, fixed income, real estate and private equity, they all over performed their respective targets. Not doing as well were domestic equity, RE-IT's, infrastructure and hedge funds all trailed their assigned targets. Finally, largely due to our economic conditions over the past few years, our performance trailed over the past three year measure and also lagged during the past five years.

PERSONAL COMMENT

As this report is being written the Dow Jones Industrial average has been firting with the 13,000 level and if this continues over a period of time, it should forecast growth in the months to come. The problems we are having in the public pension fund arena can be well noted with the following observation from a group that publishes a newsletter for all of us. In their publications one branch of government was stepping up rhetoric on cutting public pension benef ts while in the same branch a conference was being planned to study the growing problem of poverty among senior citizens. This says it all! Have a wonderful spring season.

PENSIONS MATTER

The Pension Laws and Rules Committee of the

Chicago Teachers Pension fund (CTPF) has met several times with representatives of Retired Teachers Association of Chicago (RTAC), the Principals and Administrators Association (CPAA), and the Chicago Teachers Union (CTU). Fact sheets (see below) were prepared by CTGPF that should be used by all members in conversations with their legislators. The future of all participants both active and retired is at stake in this legislative session, and every effort must be made to contact our representatives either before adjournment in May or during the fall session.

Pensions provide secure and stable retirements for teachers, administrators, and public school personnel, yet their very existence has come under attack. CTPF sets the record straight.

 CTPF members do not contribute to or receive Social Security retirement benef ts

A pension is the primary source of CTPF members' retirement security. The normal Social Security contribution is 6%, but CTPF members contribute 9% of their earnings to fund their retirement pensions. Benef ts earned over a lifetime of service are deferred compensation, guaranteed by Illinois law. The average CTPF retiree receives \$41,584 annually after investing 28 years of service in the Chicago Public Schools.

2. Pensions create a positive impact on Illinois' economy

A 2009 study by the National Institute on Retirement Security found that in the State of Illinois, each \$1

paid out in pension benef ts supported \$1.50 in economic activity.

3. Funding problems, not generous benef ts, caused the current f nancial problems with the pension system

Prior to 1995, the Chicago Public Schools Board of Education (CPS) funded pensions on an annual basis through a property tax levy. In May 1995, CPS sought and received a change in the law which al-

lowed it to keep pension tax revenue. From 1995 to 2005, CPS made no contributions to the pension fund. This costly measure redirected more than \$2 billion in funds designated for pensions into the CPS operating budget. CPS was forgiven an additional \$1.2 billion dollars in funding relief from the Illinois legislature in 2010.

4. The State of Illinois provides minimal CTPF funding

State support for CTPF has fallen in recent years. CTPF received \$32.5 million in 201 1, while the Teachers' Retirement System (TRS) received more than \$2.5 billion. Chicago's taxpayers bear a double burden, funding TRS and their own system, without equal benef t.

5. Retirees depend on CTPF for health insurance

CTPF offers comprehensive group health insurance for members who must pay for their coverage after retirement (many do not qualify for "free" Medicare Part A). The fund offers a health insurance premium subsidy, to help of fset insurance costs, but it is limited to \$65 million per year. CTPF

The CTPF Board of Trustees set the following legislative agenda during their February 2012 meeting, and is working actively to promote these bills in Springf eld.

CURRENT LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

1. Eliminate the offset of State of Illinois revenue-HB 5334 sponsored by Representative Marlow H. Colvin (D)

SB 3632 sponsored by Senator Kwame Raoul (D)

Summary: Beginning in 2013, any state contribution received by CTPF will be in addition to CPS contributions.

Rationale: Under current practice, contributions to CTPF from the CPS Board of Education are reduced by any amount CTPF receives from the State of Illinois. These proposals eliminate the offset which would increase total fund revenues.

2. Increase State of Illinois contributions to CTPF.

HB 5232 sponsored by Representative Monique D. Davis (D)

SB 3628 sponsored by Senator Kwame Raoul (D)

Summary: These bills require the State of Illinois to contribute \$270,347,800 to CTPF in 2013After 2013, the State would be required to make an annual CTPF contribution equal to 10% of the State contribution to the Teachers' Retirement System (Suburban and Downstate Teacher Pensions).

Rationale: In 1995 the State of Illinois agreed in principal to fund CTPF at an amount equal to 20%-30% of the amount it awards to the Teachers Retirement System. This funding failed to materialize. These bills ask the State of Illinois to fulf II its promise to fund pensions for Chicago teachers.

3. Increase FY 2013 CPS contributions to CTPF HB 5333 sponsored by Representative Marlow H. Colvin (D)

SB 3742 sponsored by Senator Kwame Raoul (D)

Summary: These bills increase the 2013 CPS contribution to CTPF from \$196 million to \$307 million.

Rationale: In 2010, CPS was required to pay \$307 million to CTPF, and the amount was scheduled to increase in future years. CPS asked for and received pension "relief" from the Illinois legislature in 2010, which reduced the CPS obligation for f scal years 2011-13. When the relief measure expires, CPS will be required to pay more than \$557 million to fund CTPF pensions in 2014. These bills reset the CPS obligation to the 2010 level, in order to "ramp up" or prepare for larger future payments.

4. Increase the cap on retiree healthcare spending

HB 5520 sponsored by Representative Daniel J. Burke (D)

SB 3598 sponsored by Senator Iris Y. Martinez (D)

Summary: These bills change the structure of the health insurance spending cap from a at amount to an amount that adjusts annually. The annual adjustment would increase based on the average of the medical care services and commodities indexes in the consumer price index.

Rationale: The amount that CTPF can spend to subsidize retiree health insurance premiums is currently limited to \$65 million per year. The spending cap was set in 2004, and since that time the number of retirees and the cost of care have nearly doubled. The cap needs to be raised so CTPF can continue to help retirees cope with rising health insurance costs.

5. Redef ne re-employment provision for retirees

HB 5744 sponsored by Representative Robert Rita (D)

SB 3597 sponsored by Senator Iris Y. Martinez (D)

Summary: these bills clearly outline the return to work rules for members who seek re-employment in the CPS system.

Rationale: If a retiree wants to return to CPS employment and maintain a pension, there are certain restrictions

which must be met. These bills establish the limits of CPS re-employment, and outline the steps a retiree must take to become re-employed without forfeiting pension benef ts.

- The fund paid \$78.9 million in health insurance subsides in 2011.

FUNDED RATIO

CTPF's funded ratio as of June 30, 2011, fell to 59.7%. The ratio was nearly 100% in 2005 and has declined steadily since that time.

The entertainment industry comes in for its share of greed. They are guilty of foisting on the public, movies, videos, music and reality shows that are in some cases downright vulgar and salacious. If it makes money, it's a go. The public and our youth be damned.

There is no shortage of other examples of greed. Is there any cure for this malady that is like an epidemic? I think so. When society starts to put group interest above self interest and realizes that what happens to one happens to all, we'll be on our way. The protests we are witnessing, could be the beginning.

The Spotlight is on....

PAST PRESIDENT MAE HUNTER

After teaching at the Betsy Ross School, Mae returned after starting her family and spent more than 25 years at Shoesmith Elementary in Hyde Park. Looking back over her career , Mae said that in addition to teaching for 38 years and parenting she also expendeded much energy in the Chicago Teachers Union (CTU) going all the way up to the position of National Delegate.

After retirement in 1999, Mae served the Chicago Teachers Pension Fund as a Trustee and Fnancial Secretary. In 1999 she also became president of RTAC. Membership increased immensely during her two-year term; attendance at the luncheons also increased immensely. "Our f nancial standing was solid," Mae said." [Members were] so happy at the luncheons. [There was an] atmosphere of happiness at the luncheons. [Members] Could see the joy of being a member; and they told others."



TEACHER NURSE GAVE HER ALL FOR COUNTRY, FAMILY AND CPS

Most if not all CPS teachers can be classif ed as "unsung heroes" one way or another. But one group in particular is almost always overlooked when the kudos are being handed out—the Teacher Nurses. They perform many child and teen services that classroom teachers are often unaware of, and they show devotion to the vast number of students in the schools they serve sometimes even supplying clothing and other supplies that so many Chicago school children are sadly lacking..

One such Teacher Nurse was Eileen M. Byrne who passed away last December 26 at the age of 97. Her daughter, also named Eileen Byrne and a Special Ed teacher for CPS, and her good friend and colleague Terry Dumond submitted a beautiful *Sun-Times* obituary article about Mrs. Byrne that detailed her life of outstanding service to her country, to her family and to the children of Chicago schools.

After graduating from Austin High School and the St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing, Eileen O'Connell began her career in the psychiatric hospitals of Chicago. When W orld War II began, she signed up to be an Army nurse and cared for injured soldiers at some of the most notable con ficts of the war including D-Day, the Normandy Invasion and Omaha Beach.

In 1948 she met and married Charles Byrne. She completed her degree at DePaul University and became a Teacher Nurse with CPS. Interrupting her career to raise a family, Eileen and Charles had f ve children and resided in the Edgebrook neighborhood of Chicago. At the age of 49, she was tragically widowed and left with a young family to provide for.

She immediately resumed her career with CPS and also took on a second full-time job working in various Chicago area nursing homes. "This woman never took a day off," said fellow Teacher Nurse Terry Dumond, who worked with Eileen in the schools.

"She raised five children and always worked two jobs."

Eileen loved to work with children, and she provided many services far beyond what was expected. Sun-Times the article her son said, "She could pick up on kids who were hard of hearing, kids who had heart murmurs. went to my uncles, who were dentists, to do free work [on

the students], "wherever she could get free help for anybody, because she knew disabilities were a huge impediment."

In the same article, her daughter said: "She worked two full-time jobs but never missed an important meeting involving her kids. She worked in public schools all day, [would] come home and make dinner, then she worked from 1 1 to 7 overnight at various nursing homes. Then, in the morning, went to the Board [of Education] again. She never slept, except, like, catnaps — for 15 years."

Frances Belmonte-Mann, a retired CPS nurse and instructor at the University of Illinois at Chicago was also quoted in the obituary: "Eileen never missed a day of work....Every Christmas, Mrs. Byrne bought and wrapped presents for dozens of schoolchildren who were facing lean holidays."

Eileen Byrne worked as a Teacher Nurse until the mandatory retirement age. Then she became a consulting nurse. She was 92 when she retired.

Surely, Teacher Nurse Eileen M. Byrne is one of the great unsung heroes of the CPS.

NEW LAWS THAT MAY AFFECT YOU

I. Living Trusts and Tenants by the Entirety

Many married couples in Illinois hold title to their homestead property as "tenants by the entirety ," a form of ownership available to married couples. 765 ILCS 1005/1(c). This form of ownership is similar to that of "joint tenancy with right of survivorship," which is a form of ownership available to any persons. Although all characteristics of joint tenancy with right of survivorship also characterize tenants by the entirety, some differences between these two forms of ownership exist and are as follows:

- Holding title as tenants by the entirety is available only to married couples;
- Holding title as tenants by the entirety is available only for ownership of homestead property;
- Couples holding title as tenants by the entirety may not give away, sell or otherwise convey their respective shares of their property unless both partners agree.
- For couples who own their home as tenants by the entirety, creditors generally cannot force the sale of the home to satisfy a judgment entered against only one spouse; a judgment would need to be against both partners in order to attach to the property. This is particularly attractive to couples when one or both of the partners have occupations that put them in more danger of lawsuits.

For couples who engage in estate planning, there are estate benefts to putting their property into the partners' living trusts, advantages that include, without limitation, avoidance of probate and minimizing estate taxes for married couples. Couples in the past have needed to choose between the benefts of ownership of homestead property individually as tenants by the entirety or the benefts of trust ownership.

Good news! As of January 1, 201 1, the living trusts of married persons may hold title to homestead property as tenants by the entirety. Public Act 96-1145. A couple that owns their homestead property will have all the benef ts of tenants by the entirety and some of the benef ts of trust ownership, although not all such benef ts. This new ownership

opportunity will not be automatic. he language on the deeds to convey property to properly accomplish this will need to be carefully drawn.

II. New Estate Tax Laws

Estate taxes are taxes imposed on the assets held by persons at the time of their death. Estate taxes, along with inheritance taxes, are often referred to as "death taxes." There are some new laws that are complicated, but it is a good idea for all of us to have some concept of what these laws are. This is a brief and simplifed attempt to give the readers an idea of what these laws accomplish. Certainly, this article is not an adequate alternative to seeking good, thorough legal and tax advice.

There is a difference between estate tax and inheritance tax.

- Estate tax is imposed upon the assets of the person who died before the assets are distributed according to wills, trusts, bene f ciary designations or state laws on descent and distribution for intestate estates (those with no valid will). Estate taxes are imposed by the federal government and some state governments, including Illinois.
- Inheritance tax is imposed upon the recipient of assets inherited. Neither the federal government nor Illinois imposes inheritance tax, but some states do, including Indiana (although Indiana will be phasing this out).

Estate tax has been aimed at individuals with very high net worth. For mostAmericans, estate tax is not an issue. In fact, in 2010, there was no federal or Illinois estate tax at all, so it was not an issue for anyone. For 2011, an estate of \$5,000,000 or less is exempt from federal estate tax (The 2010 Tax Relief Act), and an estate of \$2,000,000 or less is exempt from Illinois estate tax (the Taxpayer Accountability and Budget Stabilization Act of Illinois). thus, if the estate of an Illinois resident is less than

\$2,000,000, that individual does not have to worry about any estate tax. All persons, especially those with estates between \$2,000,000 and \$5,000,000, should consult their legal and tax advisors as to how to best plan for their estates under the new laws.

When the estate tax wasf rst imposed, the government made a deal with the citizens. In exchange for the estate tax imposition, the IRS would honor a "step-up in basis," which would not affect the estate tax, but rather would advantageously affect individuals paying capital gains tax. A step-up in basis means that when a person inherits property, the tax basis of that property is the higher of the cost basis of the decedent for the property or the current fair market value of the property. Prior to 2010 (but not in 2010), and again in 2011, taxpayers have had the

benef t of a step-up in basis for inherited property . In 2010, there was no step-up in basis. Why does this matter? When we sell an asset, we pay capital gains tax on the dif ference between the price we receive from the sale and the basis. The higher the basis, the lower the tax.

Good news! In 2011, an estate of a decedent has an option to choose between 2010 law or 2011 law. For most persons, 2011 law will be more advantageous. This is a decision that should be made very carefully after receiving advice from a knowledgeable tax advisor.

I cannot stress strongly enough how important it is to seek good advice regarding these issues. This article is not thorough enough to properly educate you as to these issues, but is intended to let you know these issues are out there for your




